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As an operator, you can use the IBM 5280 system to process a number of business applications at your location.

The following overviews of the system keyboards, display screen, control panel, diskette, and diskette drives should help you become more familiar with the system. A short exercise at the end of the discussion allows you to start and operate the system.

# **KEYBOARD OVERVIEW**

The keyboard on the 5280 system is an arrangement of keys that allows you to operate the system.



See Keyboards in this manual for a detailed discussion of the 5280 keyboards.

# DISPLAY SCREEN OVERVIEW

The display screen is the interface between you and the system. Data, messages, and other information are displayed on the screen.



#### Cursor

The cursor appears on the display screen as an underline to a character position. The cursor shows the position on the 5280 display screen that the next character entered from the keyboard will occupy. It may be moved on the display screen using the cursor movement keys without interfering with other characters.

#### **Status Line**

The status line, when displayed, is the first row information on the display. This line provides information about the job currently being processed in the system, such as the mode of operation, keyboard shift, and current record number.



#### **Display Prompt**

A display prompt is a request for you to enter information or to perform some other action. For example, the following prompt requests that you enter information to load a program.

#### **CONTROL PANEL OVERVIEW**

The data station control panel contains the Brightness control, Contrast control, and the Power switch. The Brightness control allows you to adjust the brightness of the display characters. The Contrast control allows you to adjust the brightness of the high intensity fields and of the cursor. The Power switch turns the device on or off.

The control panel on the 5288 contains the Power On and Off switch. Depending on your system, the control panel might also contain the diskette drive-in-use indicator(s) and/or the keylock feature. This information is presented later.



#### **DISKETTE OVERVIEW**

A diskette is a small, flexible, magnetic disk permanently enclosed in a protective jacket.



As an operator, you can load programs from the diskette, save information on the diskette, and retrieve information that has previously been entered on the diskette.

An additional storage envelope is provided to protect the diskette when it is not in use. The diskette must be handled carefully when it is removed from the envelope.



## **DISKETTE DRIVE OVERVIEW**

The diskette drive is a device used to read and write data on diskettes. The diskette locking lever holds the diskette inside the drive during operation. The diskette drive label identifies the diskette drive type. There are two drive types: 1 and 2D. See *Diskettes* for information on what kind of diskettes can be inserted into the two drive types. When the diskette drive-in-use indicator is on, the diskette in that drive is being used.



# **GETTING FAMILIAR WITH THE SYSTEM: A SHORT EXERCISE**

1. If your system is powered on and the following prompt is displayed, do the following exercise. If the prompt is not displayed, see *Starting the System* or contact your supervisor.

2. Adjust the display screen for visual comfort:

To adjust the brightness of the cursor turn the  $\$  (Contrast control) to the left or right.



To adjust the brightness of the characters displayed on the display screen, turn the 💢 (Brightness control) to the left or to the right. Turning it to the right makes the display image brighter; to the left, dimmer. There is no correct setting for the brightness of the image. Experiment with this control until you find the setting that is most convenient and comfortable for your viewing. You may find that you want to change the brightness as more characters are displayed on the display screen. Even the job you are working on might influence the brightness that you find comfortable.

**Note:** On the 5282 and 5286, one switch controls the brightness at both stations.

5282/5286 Mirror Adjustment



The mirror can be placed in one of two positions for your easiest viewing. To adjust the mirror, lift up on the mirror, as shown, and position its front edge on the top or bottom ledge of the mirror housing.



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When you press a data type key, you should hear a click that indicates the keystroke is accepted. At the same time the character should appear on the screen. Some of the keys on the keyboard are typamatic keys. This means that the keys repeat their character or their function automatically if held down. Press and hold the S key until five or six S's appear on the display screen. Notice that when the key is held down, the character is automatically entered again. Always press and release a data key immediately, unless you want to enter multiples of that character. Now press and hold the **S** (Character Backspace) key until the cursor moves back to the beginning of the field. Before you perform the next task, write down the contents of the status line. Now key the word SYSTEN. The screen should look like this:

Now look at the status line; notice that the number of positions remaining in the input field changed from 16 to 10. Also, notice that the input record character position changed from 1 to 7.

The vertical bars on the screen are called column separators. Each space between the bars can contain one character. In the following example SYSTEN occupies 6 of the 16 spaces.

The status line indicates 10 remaining spaces.

There are 10 remaining positions within the input field, as indicated on the status line.

# Changing Data on the Load Prompt

To update or correct the displayed data, position the cursor under the character to be changed and then enter the correct data. Use the Correct (Character Backspace) key to position the cursor under the N in SYSTEN.

The N shown on the status line indicates that the current input field is in *numeric shift*. When you are using a data entry keyboard, numeric shift means that the top character on a data key is entered when you press the key.



For example, if you press the  $\begin{bmatrix} \cdot \\ c \end{bmatrix}$  key in numeric shift, the quote (  $^{++}$ ) character is entered. To enter the bottom character on the key, press and hold the Alpha shift key and press the  $\begin{bmatrix} \cdot \\ c \end{bmatrix}$  key. The character C is entered. If the keyboard is in alpha shift (an A replaces the N on the status line), you must press the Num key to enter the top character on the key. (If you are using a typewriter keyboard, the keyboard shift indicated on the status line does not determine which character is entered when a key is pressed.)

Now, enter the device address 5C00. Remember, if you are using a data entry keyboard, you must press and hold the Alpha shift key as you press the  $\overline{\binom{n}{c}}$  key.

The display screen should look like this:



Next Input Field

After you enter 5C00, the cursor should automatically advance to the next input field. For the purpose of this exercise, enter the character 1.



You see a blinking cursor. The blinking cursor means one of the following conditions occured as you entered data:

- 1. The input record or prompt has been filled with data. In this case, the input record character position on the status line equals 0 and the auto record advance function is not active. This condition is called *awaiting* record advance and you must press the Enter/Rec Adv key to continue.
- The input field (which has been specified as field exit required) has been filled with data. In this case, the positions remaining in the field counter on the status line equals 1. This condition is called *awaiting field exit* and

you must press a field exit key such as the Field Exit key or the (Field Advance) key.

Now, for this exercise, remove the character 1 from the display prompt by first pressing the (Character Backspace) key. (Notice that the cursor stopped blinking but did not move. Attempting to change or remove data when the cursor is blinking causes an error.) Now press the Spacebar once; the character 1 is deleted.

For more information on removing data from the display screen, see *Command* Keys and *Function Keys*.

#### **Recovering from an Error Condition**

Press the Enter key; this causes an error for this exercise. Notice a blinking status line.

The error code means that you pressed the wrong key or you entered the wrong information. Normally, when you encounter an error condition, you should refer to the *Message Manual* for the correct recovery procedure. For this example, press the Reset key or the Error Reset key to bring back the load prompt.

## **STARTING THE SYSTEM (IPL)**

Whenever the system has been powered off, you must start the system.

1. Unlock the keylock feature if it is installed on your device; turn the key to the right. Only one of the two keys supplied with your system allows you to turn the key to the right. For the location of the keylock on your controller, see *Keylock Feature* in this section.



Turn Right

- If there are auxiliary data stations (5281s or 5282s) attached to your 5280 system, set the Power switch on each of these devices to the 1 (On) position.
- 3. Insert the IPL diskette into any diskette drive and close the diskette locking lever.

#### Make sure that only one IPL diskette is inserted into the system.

Although the IPL program can be loaded from any diskette drive, the system indicators are displayed (during system checkout) at keyboard 0 only. Keyboard 0 can be identified by a label in the upper left corner of the keyboard.

4. Set the Power switch on the controller (5285, 5286, or 5288) to the 1 (On) position.

Turning the power switch on causes the 5280 system to load the IPL program. You might see changing display patterns on the screen(s) and hear buzzing sounds. When the IPL program has been successfully loaded into the system, either the load prompt or the date prompt appears. You can now remove the IPL diskette from the diskette drive. If you do not see one of the following prompts, go to *Determining System Problems* in this section.

## **RESTARTING THE SYSTEM AFTER IT HAS BEEN RUNNING**

Contact the other operators before you restart (perform another IPL) the system to be sure that they do not have any programs in process or open data sets.

There are two methods to restart the system: using a keying sequence from the keyboard or using the Power switch. Using the keying sequence is the recommended procedure.

#### **Keying Sequence**

- 1. Insert the IPL diskette and close the diskette locking lever.
- 2. Press the Cmd key, press and hold the Num key or the (Shift key), and then press the G key.

### **Power Switch**

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- 1. Remove all diskettes from the system.
- 2. Set the Power switch on the controller (5288, 5286, or 5285) to the 0 (Off) position.
- 3. Insert the IPL diskette and close the diskette locking lever.
- 4. Wait at least 10 seconds, and then set the Power switch to the I (On) position.

## **STOPPING THE SYSTEM**

- 1. Be sure that all programs have completed processing:
  - a. All red (diskette drive-in-use) indicators are off (data sets closed).
  - b. Load prompts are displayed on all data stations (that are powered on).
- 2. Check with your supervisor to be sure that no background programs are active.
- 3. Remove all diskettes.
- 4. Dump the error log (see the next procedure).
- 5. Set the switch on the control unit to the 0 (Off) position.

# **DUMPING THE ERROR LOG**

The error log is information that will assist your service representative when your system requires service. Do the following:

- 1. Begin this procedure with the load prompt displayed.
- 2. Insert the machine verification diskette.
- 3. Enter TSYSLOG, and press the Field Exit key or the Field + key.
- 4. Enter the device address of the diskette drive that contains the machine verification diskette, and press the Enter key.

When the program is loaded, the following display appears.

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- 5. Enter 2 and press the Enter key. The load prompt is displayed.
- 6. Remove the verification diskette, insert it into its protective jacket, and return it to the binder.

# SECURITY FEATURES

Some IBM 5280 devices are equipped with a keylock and/or magnetic stripe reader(s).

#### **Keylock Feature**

The keylock feature prevents the entry and the display of data at all data stations when the key is in the locked position.

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The keylock, if present, is in different locations on the 5288, 5286, and 5285 as indicated.



If your controller has the keylock feature, use procedure (a) for normal operation, such as data entry or running a utility. Use procedure (b) for setting up a communications job. Use procedure (c) for preventing the use of any or all of the keyboards attached to the 5280 system.

Separate keys are required for normal operations and for setting up communications jobs. Also, the keys can be inserted and removed only in the upright (locked) position.

a. For normal operation, insert the correct key and turn it to the right.



b. To set up a communications job, insert the correct key and turn it to the left. Once the communications job has been set up, turn the keylock to the right for normal operation (see step a).



c. To prevent the use of your system, turn the key to the upright (locked) position and remove the key. After a 5280 has been set up for an unattended communications job, it is recommended that you position the key in the locked position to prevent accidental data entry.



#### **Magnetic Stripe Reader Feature**

The magnetic stripe reader is an optional feature that reads magnetic encoded stripes on identification cards.

How To Use The Magnetic Stripe Reader

To use the magnetic stripe reader:

- 1. If your device has the keylock feature, you must turn the key to the left or right before you can use the magnetic stripe reader.
- 2. Place the card to be read, as shown:



3. Move the card smoothly and continuously from right to left through the reader. (The card must remain against the bottom surface of the slot.)

# CLEANING YOUR SYSTEM

## CAUTION

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Do not use a cleaner that contains isopropyl alcohol, which can damage the surface of the 5280 system.

Use a cloth dampened with a mild soap solution to clean the covers, the keyboard, the display tube face, and the display mirror (5282 and 5286 only).

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# **DISKETTE HANDLING**

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Some helpful hints for protecting diskettes:

- · When you are not using the diskette, keep it in the protective envelope.
- Put the diskette in the envelope before writing on the label so that the label is visible through the cutaway front of the envelope.
- Always handle the diskette by the label area to avoid touching the recording surface. Fingerprints on the surface can cause permanent diskette errors.
- Use a file folder or a carrier envelope to carry the diskette.
- · Keep magnets away from the diskette.
- If you are mailing diskettes, place them in a box or a heavy cardboard mailer to prevent bending that might be encountered in normal shipping and handling.

# **DISKETTE TYPE**

You can determine a diskette type by looking at the label on the diskette.



There are three diskette types. The labels for the three diskette types are:



A diskette 1 can be used in either a type 1 or type 2D diskette drive; however, diskettes 2 and 2D can be used only in the 2D diskette drive. The diskette drive type is located near the diskette drive.



**Note:** If a diskette 2 or 2D is inserted into a type 1 diskette drive, a 3151 error code is displayed when the program attempts to use the data set.

# HOW TO INSERT THE DISKETTE

- 1. Make sure that the diskette type you insert matches the diskette drive type. (Diskettes 2 and 2D cannot be used in a type 1 diskette drive).
- 2. Make sure that the diskette drive-in-use indicator is off. Turn the diskette locking lever up. If there is a diskette in the diskette drive, remove it and place it in the protective envelope.



# CAUTION

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Insert the diskette slowly to ensure that it is seated properly in the drive. If it is not resting against the back of the drive, the diskette might be damaged when you turn the diskette locking lever.

3. Remove the diskette from the envelope and insert the diskette into the drive with the label facing to the left, as shown.



4. Turn the diskette locking lever down.

#### HOW TO REMOVE A DISKETTE

# CAUTION

Do not remove a diskette when the diskette drive-in-use indicator is on (the data set is open and data can be lost). Removing a diskette when the diskette drive-in-use indicator is on causes a loud buzzing sound. If this sound is heard, close the diskette locking lever without removing the diskette.

- 1. Turn the diskette locking lever up.
- 2. Pull the diskette from the drive.
- 3. Put the diskette in its envelope and label it, if you have not already done so.

#### **DISKETTE WEAR**

The use of flexible diskette storage provides some significant advantages, such as low cost, compact size, multiple system functions, and ease of media handling and storage. It should be recognized, however, that during recording and reading, the read/write head is in contact with the media, causing diskette wear over time. Variations in the rate of wear will depend on the particular operating environment and application characteristics. Care in the storage, use and handling can also affect diskette life. Excessive wear, handling, or contamination can cause possible failures in recording and/or reading.

Ultimate wear is to some extent dependent upon total usage of individual tracks. Care taken to distribute data so that accessing occurs over the entire recording surface with about the same frequency can extend the useful life of the diskette. Actual experience with individual applications and environments will allow development of guidelines as to when the media should be replaced.

Unpredictable circumstances such as contamination or severe handling can cause an early error to occur.

#### DEFECTIVE DISKETTE DATA RECOVERY

#### CAUTION

Use this procedure only if you are familiar with diskette labels and the data on the diskette.

If a diskette becomes defective after data is already stored on it, data can be lost. To recover the maximum amount of data from a defective diskette, use the diskette data recovery procedure (SYSRCVR) in the *Machine Verification Manual.*

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# **STOPPING THE PRINTER**

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If you must stop the printer to adjust the forms or observe the printed output, follow the procedure for your type of printer.

If your printer has a control panel with a Stop or Stop/Reset switch, such as the 5256 or 5225 printers:

- 1. Press the Stop switch on the control panel. The printer will stop after printing a few lines.
- 2. Adjust the forms or observe the printed output.
- 3. When you are ready to continue printing, press the Start switch on the printer control panel.
- 4. Press the Reset key on the keyboard. This will clear the error message on the display screen and start the printer.

If your printer does not have a control panel, such as the 5222 printer, follow this procedure from the keyboard attached to the partition controlling the printer.

- 1. Press the Sys Req key. The Load prompt is displayed. The printer will stop after printing a few lines.
- 2. Adjust the forms or observe the printed output.
- 3. When you are ready to continue, press the Cncl key. This cancels the Load prompt and starts the printer.

#### ENDING THE JOB AFTER STOPPING THE PRINTER

To end a job after pressing Stop to stop printing:

- Press Start on the printer to empty the internal buffers of the printer. (If this is not done, any data left in the internal buffers will be held and printed when Start is pressed.)
- 2. Press Command and End of Job, and select Exit at the exit prompt.

# INITIATING END OF JOB FROM THE PRINTER

To end a job from the printer or to stop printing without data held in the internal buffers, press Cancel on the printer (if the printer is so equipped). This causes an error message (2601) on the display screen and the printer will print the remaining data contained in the internal buffers. To change or align forms after the printer ceases printing, press Stop.

You now have the option of continuing with the job by pressing Start on the Printer and Reset on the keyboard, or ending the job by pressing Command and End of Job.

# PRINTER OUT OF FORMS

When a printer out of form condition occurs, the 2150 message code will be displayed. The necessary action in response to this message varies according to the type of printer. See the IBM 5280 Messages Manual for the action required for your printer.

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The status line is the first line of information on the display. It is displayed after the system has been started and during the loading and execution of DE/RPG programs, KEU programs, and some utilities.



This section describes the first 39 positions of the status line. The status line is displayed in one of two ways: for normal operation or for error conditions.

**Note:** During COBOL program execution, the contents of the status line will be different than described in this section. See the *IBM 5280 COBOL Programmer's Guide* for the correct description.

# NORMAL OPERATION

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#### **Partition Number**

The partition number indicates the partition to which your keyboard is attached.

### **Input Record Character Position**

Indicates the position in the record where the next character will be stored. When awaiting record advance, this position equals 0.

# **Field Definition**

Indicates the keyboard shift of the current field. One of the following characters is displayed.

Y–Numeric only
D-Digits only
W-Right half shift
V-Right half only

For definitions, see the DE/RPG Reference Manual or the Utilities Reference/Operation Manual.

### **Character Insert**

The symbol (>) is displayed when character insert mode is active.

#### **Positions Remaining In A Field**

Indicates the number of character positions remaining in the current field as follows:

- When the number of positions remaining to be keyed is greater than 99, two asterisks (\* \*) are displayed.
- When the cursor is in the first position of a field, the field length is displayed.
- · When the cursor is in the last position of a field, 01 is displayed.
- When the cursor is in the last position of a field and awaiting field exit, the cursor is flashing and 01 is displayed.
- When the cursor is in the last position of a record and awaiting record advance, the cursor is flashing and 00 is displayed.

## **Hex Value**

Indicates the hexadecimal value of the character in the current record that corresponds to the current cursor position.

#### **Record Number**

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Indicates the number of the record in the data set for the record currently displayed. This number includes both data records and deleted records.

# Automatic Duplicate/Skip

Displays the reverse image o when the automatic duplicate/skip function is on. When this function is off, this position is blank.

### Automatic Record Advance

Displays the reverse image **R** when the automatic record advance function is on. When this function is off, the position is blank.

# Format Number or Format ID

Indicates the number or ID of the format that you are currently using.

# **Program Mode**

Indicates the mode in which the program is operating. The mode appears in one or two parts. The first part indicates the primary mode. The second part indicates a secondary mode:

## Record Verify/Record Mark (DE/RPG)

This position contains a V if the record has been verified or an E if the record has been marked.

# **Highest Format Number (KEU)**

Indicates the highest format number available for the current KEU job.

# **ERROR CONDITIONS**

There are two types of status lines that display error conditions: the keyboard or program detected error and the device error.

#### **Keyboard Error or Program Detected Error**

When this type of error occurs, the system displays an error code, as shown below. The status line blinks.

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The information on the status line is the same as the status line for normal operation, except for the error code (-XXXX-). See the *IBM 5280 COBOL Programmer's Guide* for an explanation of the format of the error codes while COBOL program is executing.

**Note:** When an error code appears, do not press the Reset key until you write the error code on a piece of paper or know the correct recovery procedure. See the *Message Manual* for description of the recovery procedures.

### **Device Error**

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When this type of error occurs, the system displays an error code and changes the status line. The status line blinks. The device error status line is different from the status line used for normal operation, as shown.



#### Partition Number

The partition number indicates the partition to which your keyboard is attached.

#### **Device** Address

Displays the address of the device where the error occurred.

#### Error Code

Displays the error code for the error that occurred.

**Note:** When an error code appears, do not press the Reset key until you write the error code on a piece of paper or know the correct recovery procedure. See the *Message Manual* for a description of the recovery procedures.

#### Logical Device ID

Indicates the logical ID of the device where the error occurred.

### Program Name

Displays the name of the program that is loaded. If an error occurs when you are loading a program, the name of a previously loaded program might be displayed.

# Data Set Name

Displays the name of the data set for which the error occurred. If an error occurs when you are loading a program, the name of the program you attempted to load is displayed.

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All programs operate in partitions. Two kinds of partitions exist: foreground and background. Every foreground partition is automatically attached to a keyboard. A background partition can be temporarily attached to a keyboard for one of the following reasons:

• To start a job in a background partition.

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- To respond to a program that is operating in the background partition and wants your attention (a program request).
- To interrupt a program operating in a background partition (ending or cancelling a background program).

Use one of the following procedures to attach to a background partition.

# STARTING A BACKGROUND PROGRAM

To start a job in the background partition while the load prompt is displayed in a foreground partition:

- Respond to the load prompt and enter the background partition number where the program is to be loaded. After you press the Enter key, the partition number on the status line changes to indicate which background partition you are in. Note, that for some utilities, the status line is not displayed.
- 2. Start the program. If you are executing a utility program, wait until the *utility in process* prompt is displayed before you go to step 3.
- 3. Press the Attn key to return to the foreground partition. The partition number on the status line changes to indicate which partition you are in.

**Note:** If the load prompt is not completely displayed, press the Attn key to redisplay the load prompt.

To start a job in the background partition while processing a job in the foreground partition:

- 1. Press the Sys Req key. The load prompt is displayed.
- Respond to the load prompt and enter the background partition number where the program is to be loaded. After you press the Enter key, the partition number on the status line changes to indicate which background partition you are in. Note, that for some utilities, the status line is not displayed.
- 3. Start the program. If you are executing a utility program, wait until the

utility in process prompt is displayed before you go to step 4.

4. Press the Attn key to return to the foreground partition. The partition number on the status line changes to indicate which partition you are in.

# **BACKGROUND PROGRAM REQUEST**

A program operating in a background partition can request operator intervention by displaying a solid rectangular block, located in the rightmost position of the 6th line on the display. On a secondary display of a dual data station (5282 and 5286), the indicator appears in the leftmost position of the 6th line on the display.



5281, 5282, 5285, and 5286 (Side with the Power Switch)

To respond to a background program request:

- 1. Complete the record or prompt you are entering and press the Enter/Rec Adv key.
- 2. Press the Attn key to connect to the background partition.
- 3. Respond to the program request. If you select an option that ends the program, the system automatically returns to the foreground partition. Otherwise, go to step 4.
- 4. Press the Attn key to return to the foreground partition. If more than one background partition is active, you may have to press the Attn key more than once to get back to the foreground partition.

# ENDING A BACKGROUND PROGRAM

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When you are in a foreground partition and a background program has completed executing, you should respond to the program request that is displayed. A program request is discussed in the previous procedure.

# **CANCELING A BACKGROUND PROGRAM**

To cancel a program in the background partition which does not have a program request displayed:

- 1. Press the Cmd key, the C key, the B key, and the partition number to connect to the background partition.
- 2. See the appropriate section (*KEU Job*, *DE/RPG Job*, or *Communications*) for the procedures for ending a job. For other utilities, see the appropriate reference/operation manual.
- 3. Once the program in the background partition ends, the system automatically returns to the foreground partition.

**Note:** If the load prompt in the foreground partition is not completely displayed, press the Attn key to redisplay the load prompt.

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The KEU (key entry utility) allows you to enter data without the use of a compiled program. The utility has three primary modes of operation: enter, update, and verify.

The key entry utility can also be used to create, change, and save formats and prompting records. A format is a set of codes that control how data is entered into a record. The codes indicate the position, type, and length of each field in the record. A prompting record contains messages that can be displayed to identify the contents of the fields in the associated format.

Production statistics, such as the number of keystrokes used for a specific job, are accumulated by the system during data entry operations. These statistics can be written to a diskette at the end of a KEU job.

This section gives an overview of the procedures required to create and maintain data sets in the system using KEU. The second part of this section describes how to create and maintain formats and prompting records.

# **PROCESSING A KEU JOB**

### Loading KEU

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1. Begin this procedure with the load prompt on your display.

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2. Insert the diskette containing the KEU program.

- 3. **Program name:** Enter SYSKEU and press the Field Exit key or the Field + key.
- 4. **Device address**: Enter the device address of the diskette drive containing the KEU program.
- 5. **Partition number:** When using the key entry utility, no entry is required. Press the Enter key. The primary mode menu appears, as follows:

**Preparing for Operation** 

1. Select the mode of operation. The modes function as follows:

The enter-NEW/REPLACE mode begins with the first record of a data set. It is normally used only for initial entry of data; all data previously entered for this data set is lost.

The enter-ADD mode begins at the record following the last record of the data set. It is normally used to add data to an existing data set.

The update mode begins with the first data record in the data set. It is normally used to correct or change data in an existing data set.

The verify mode begins with the first data record in the data set. It is normally used to check the accuracy of entered data.

After you select the mode and press the Enter/Rec Adv key, the following prompt appears:

2. Insert the diskette to which you are going to key data.

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- 3. Data set name: Enter the name of the data set to which you are going to key data.
- 4. **Device address:** Enter the device address of the diskette drive where you inserted the diskette, then press the Enter key.
- 5. If the diskette is volume protected, the following prompt appears:

The device and data set name fields in the prompt contain the information you entered on the previous prompt.

**Owner identifier:** Enter the owner identifier for the diskette, then press the Enter key. After you press the Enter key, the data set open prompt is

redisplayed with the information you entered in steps 3 and 4. Press the Enter key again. If you did not enter the correct owner identifier, you are not allowed to access the diskette and the volume protected prompt is redisplayed.

6. If the data set you specified was not found on the diskette and you selected option 1 (enter-NEW/REPLACE) on the primary mode menu, the following prompt appears:

**Retry:** Select option 1 and press the Enter key to redisplay the data set open prompt. Selecting this option allows you to insert the correct diskette, correct the data set name, or correct the device address. Then return to step 3.

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**Allocate:** If you select enter-NEW/REPLACE, you can use option 2 to create a new data set for this job, then press the Enter key. See *Allocating a Data Set*, next in this section.

7. When the data set is opened, the display screen is blank if you selected enter-NEW/REPLACE), enter-ADD, or verify. The first record is displayed if you select update.

You are now ready to enter, update, or verify the data set, depending on the option you selected in response to the primary mode menu. Continue with the job by following the appropriate procedure listed under *Entering Data*, *Updating Data*, or *Verifying Data* in this section.

# Allocating A Data Set

1. The following prompt is displayed containing information about the data set you tried to open.

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- Data set name: If the data set name is correct, press the Field Advance) key. Otherwise, correct the data set name, then press the Field + key or the Field Exit key. Blanks are not allowed in a data set name. The system will use only the part of the data set name before the blank.
- 3. **Device address:** If the device address is correct, press the → (Field Advance) key. Otherwise, correct the device address, then press the Field + key or the Field Exit key.
- 4. Owner ID: If the owner ID (identification code) is correct or if no owner ID is required, press the (Field Advance) key. Otherwise, enter the correct owner ID, then press the Field + key or the Field Exit key.
- Exchange type: If the exchange type shown is correct, press the field Advance) key. Otherwise, enter a blank (space) for basic exchange, enter an H for H exchange, or enter an I for I exchange.
- 6. Number of records: If the remainder of the space on the diskette is to be allocated for this job, leave the value 000000 and press the field (Field Advance) key. Otherwise, enter the number of data records to be allocated in the data set, then press the Field + key or the Field Exit key to exit the field and right-adjust the entry.
- 7. Record length: Enter the record length (1 through 128) for the data set, then press the Field + key or the field Advance) key to exit the field and right-adjust the entry. If the entry for the record length is not changed, press the field Advance) key and the maximum record length (128 characters) is used.

When you are allocating a data set for production statistics, the record length must be 128.

8. Press the Enter key. After the data set has been allocated it is automatically opened.

### **Entering Data**

If you selected option 1 (enter-NEW/REPLACE), the cursor is at the first input position of the first data record. If you selected option 4 (enter-ADD), the cursor is at the first input position of the record following the last record in the data set.

If the auto record advance function is active, the next record is automatically displayed when you complete the current record. If the auto record advance function is not active, you must press the Enter/Rec Adv key when you finish keying the current record. To activate the auto record advance function, press the Auto Enter key.

- 1. Select a format, if required (see Selecting a Format or Prompting Record).
- 2. Key the data for each input field in the record.
- 3. If the auto record advance function is not active, press the Enter/Rec Adv key when you have keyed all of the data for that record.
- 4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 for each source record.
- 5. When you have entered all the source records for the job, see *Ending A KEU Job* in this section.

## **Updating Data**

This procedure allows you to review data records and to make changes to them.

If the auto record advance function is active, the next record is automatically displayed when you complete the current record. If the auto record advance function is not active, you must press the Enter/Rec Adv key when you finish keying the current record. To activate the auto record advance function, press the Auto Enter key.

- 1. Use the Enter/Rec Adv key, or the Page Fwd key, or the Home key, (see *Function Keys*) or use one of the search functions (see *Search*) to find the record you want to update.
- 2. Select a format, if required (see Selecting a Format or Prompting Record).
- 3. Move the cursor (by pressing the Field Advance key or the Field Advance key or the Field in the record to be updated.
- 4. Enter the new data over the data you want to update.
- 5. After you have updated the data record, press the Enter/Rec Adv key. The updated record is written back to the data set.
- 6. Repeat steps 1 through 5 for each record that requires a change.

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- 7. If you update the last record in the data set, the mode changes from update to enter mode.
- 8. To end the job, see Ending a KEU Job in this section.

## Verifying Data

This procedure is valid in the verify (V) mode. Verify mode can be selected only from the primary mode menu.

After the data set is opened, you are ready to verify the first record of the data set. The cursor is at the beginning of the first input field. The data record is not displayed.

If the auto record advance function is active, you do not need to press the Enter/Rec Adv key when you have completed the current record. To activate the auto record advance function, press the Auto Enter key.

- 1. Select a format, if required (see Selecting a Format or Prompting Record).
- 2. Enter the data from the source document. As you enter each data character, it appears on the screen if it matches the original character in the record. If the data character keyed does not match the original character, an error code is displayed (see Correcting a Data Key Mismatch). If an error results from a duplicate or skip field, see Correcting a Dup or Skip Mismatch in this section.
- 3. At the end of each record, press the Enter/Rec Adv key. The record is written back to the data set if changes were made.
- 4. When the last record in the data set is verified, the system automatically closes the data set and displays the end-of-job prompt. See *Ending a KEU Job* in this section.

#### Correcting A Data Key Mismatch

When a data key mismatch occurs, the system displays an error on the status line and the remainder of the field is displayed.

- 1. See the Message Manual for the proper recovery procedures, then press the Reset key or the Error Reset key.
- If the character mismatch resulted from a keying error, rekey the original character.

If the character mismatch resulted from an incorrect character in the record in the data set, rekey the correct character.

Changes made to the record are updated on the diskette after you finish verifying the record and advance to the next record.

**Note:** A character is accepted only if it is keyed twice in succession or if it matches the original character.

To correct several characters or an entire field:

- 1. Press the Corr key or Field Corr key (see *Function Keys*). The system fills the field with blanks, and the cursor moves to the first position of the current field so you can rekey the field as you would in enter mode.
- 2. Enter the correct field data. When the field is completed, the system displays blanks in the field, and the cursor returns to the first position of the field so you can verify it.
- 3. Rekey the field to verify it.

To correct an entire record:

- Press the Rec Corr key or press and hold the Num key, then press the Corr key (see Function Keys). The system displays the entire record with the cursor in the first position of the record. The mode indicator on the status line changes from V to V-C.
- Enter the correct record data (as if in the update mode). When the record is complete, press the Enter/Rec Adv key if the auto record advance function is not active. The system displays a blank record with the cursor in the first position of the record so you can verify it. The mode indicator changes back to V.
- 3. Rekey the record to verify it.

#### **Correcting a Dup or Skip Mismatch**

If a mismatch occurs when using the Dup or Skip key, or when a dup field or skip field is being automatically verified, the following sequence occurs:

- 1. The cursor stops at the position that caused the mismatch.
- 2. The entire field is displayed.
- 3. An error code for a verify mismatch is displayed on the status line.

To correct a dup mismatch:

- 1. Press the Reset key.
- If the character from the corresponding position of the previous record is correct, press the Dup key. The character from the previous record replaces tha character in the current record. The system then continues automatic verification to the end of the field.
- 3. If the character in the current record is correct, rekey that character, then press the Dup key. The system then continues automatic verification to the end of the field.

To correct a skip mismatch:

1. Press the Reset key.

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- 2. If the record is supposed to contain a blank in that position, press the Skip key. A blank replaces that position in the record. The system then continues to check the remainder of the field for blanks.
- 3. If the character in the record is correct, rekey that character, then press the Skip key. The system then continues to check the remainder of the field for blanks.

# Inserting a Record or a Group of Records

If an entire record or a group of records is missing:

- 1. Write down the record number that is displayed on the status line. (This is the record number of the first record inserted.)
- 2. Press the Cmd key, then press the Insert Record key.
- 3. The following prompt is displayed:

- 4. Enter the number of records to be inserted. (Valid entries are 1 through 99.) Press the Field + key or the Field Exit key, then press the Enter key. (The system displays a blank screen with format 0 selected.)
- 5. Select a format, if required (see Selecting a Format or Prompting Record).
- 6. Key in the record and press the Enter/Rec Adv key. Repeat this step until insert mode ends. Insert mode ends when one of the following conditions occurs:
  - a. You have inserted the number of records that you specified in step 4.
  - b. You press the Cancel key and then the Rec Adv key. In this case, deleted records are automatically inserted until the number of records you specified in step 4 has been satisfied. The cursor is positioned in the first manual position of the next record.
  - c. You press the Home key while the cursor is in the first manual position of a record. In this case, deleted records are automatically inserted until the number of records you specified in step 4 has been satisfied. The cursor is positioned in the first manual position of the last record inserted.

**Note:** After you have keyed the last insert record, the status line positions that indicate the program mode blinks until the insert function has been inserted.

When the insert mode ends, the mode indicator on the status line changes back to V so you can verify the records you just inserted.

 To verify the records, press the Home key or use one of the search keys (see Search) to return to the record number that you wrote down in step 1. Verify the records.

## What To Do When Interrupted While Verifying

- 1. Finish verifying the current record.
- 2. Write down the record number of the last record verified (see Status Line).
- 3. See Ending a KEU Job.

To continue an interrupted job:

- 1. Do the steps necessary to open the data set (see Loading KEU) and/or Preparing for Operation).
- 2. Use the Search Record Number key to find the data record (see Search).
- 3. Continue verifying (see Verifying Data).

#### Ending A KEU Job

 Press the Cmd key, then press the End of Job key. If you press the End of Job key while at a prompt (except the primary mode menu) and the data set is not open, the primary mode menu is automatically displayed. 3. **Data set name:** Enter the name of the data set to which you want the production statistics written.

**Device address:** Enter the device address of the diskette drive containing the diskette on which the production statistics will be written.

Press the Enter key. If the data set does not exist, the data set open failed prompt is displayed to allow you to allocate a data set. The data set you allocate must have a record length of 128. (See Allocating A Data Set). After you have allocated the data set or if the data set already exists, the following prompt appears:

## FORMATS AND PROMPTING RECORDS

A format is a set of codes that control how data is entered into a record. A prompting record can be associated with a format to identify the contents of each field in the record.

### Loading a Format or Prompting Record

There are three ways to load a format or prompting record:

- · From a diskette
- · From the keyboard with the primary mode menu displayed
- From the keyboard when a data set is open (during enter or update modes only)

The loaded formats and prompting records normally are retained until you exit from the utility (to the load prompt) or until you load another format or prompting record with the same format number.

#### From a Diskette

Loading formats or prompting records from a diskette is a KEU job in itself. This means that after you have loaded the formats and/or prompting records, you must end that job as described in *Ending a KEU Job*. After the job has been ended, the primary mode menu is displayed to allow you to select the mode of operation for the job whose formats you have just loaded.

- 1. Begin this procedure with the primary mode menu on your display.
- 2. Select option 2 for update mode.
- 3. Insert the diskette containing the formats (and prompting records) you want to use.
- 4. Respond to the data set open prompt.

**Data set name**: Enter the name of the data set that contains the formats and/or prompting records you want to load.

**Device address:** Enter the device address of the diskette drive containing the diskette with the formats or prompting records.

Press the Enter key.

- 5. Press the Enter/Rec Adv key, the Page Fwd key, or use one of the search keys (see *Search*) until the format or prompting message you want to use is displayed.
- 6. Press the Cmd key, hold down the Num key or the (Shift) key, then press the Load Format key.
- 7. Key in a format number (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, or 9). After loading the format or prompting record, the system displays a blank screen.
- 8. To load more formats or prompting records, repeat steps 5 through 7.
- 9. End the job (see Ending a KEU Job in this section).

From the Keyboard with the Primary Mode Menu displayed

- 1. Press the Cmd key, hold down the Num key or the (Shift) key, then press the Clear Screen key. The system automatically selects format 0 and displays a blank screen.
- 2. Key in the format or prompting record (see *Making a KEU Format* and *Making a Prompting Record* in this section).
- 3. Press the Cmd key, hold down the Num key or the fractional (Shift) key, and press the Load Format key.
- 4. Key in a format number (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, or 9). After loading the format or prompting record, the system displays a blank screen.
- 5. To load more formats or prompting records, repeat steps 2 through 4.
- 6. End the job (see Ending a KEU job in this section).

From the Keyboard When a Data Set is Open

- 1. Begin this procedure while you are in the enter mode (E) or update mode (U) only.
- 2. Press the Cmd key, hold down the Num key or the (Shift) key, then press the Clear Screen key. The system automatically selects format 0 and displays a blank screen.
- 3. Make sure that the auto record advance and auto Duplicate/Skip functions are off.
- 4. Key in the format or prompting record (see *Making a KEU Format* and *Making a Prompting Record* in this section).
- 5. Press the Cmd key, hold down the Num key or the (Shift) key, then press the Load Format key.

- 6. Key in a format number (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, or 9). After loading the format or prompting record, the system displays a blank screen.
- 7. To load more formats or prompting records, repeat steps 4 through 6.
- 8. You can now select the desired format and continue entering or updating data records. To redisplay the record that was displayed before you began this procedure, press the Cmd key, hold down the Num key or the (Shift) key, then press the Display Data key.

#### Saving A Format or Prompting Record On A Diskette

Formats and prompting records can be saved in a data set after they are created and loaded into the system.

- 1. Begin this procedure while the primary mode menu is displayed.
- Insert the diskette (on which the formats or prompting records will be saved) into a diskette drive.
- Select the enter-NEW/REPLACE or enter-ADD mode and respond to the data set open prompt.
- 4. Select the format or prompting record (see Selecting a Format or *Prompting Record*).
- 5. Press the Cmd key, hold down the Num or (Shift) key, then press the Change Format key. (The format or prompting record is displayed.)
- 6. Press the Enter/Rec Adv key. (The format or prompting record is written to the data set.)
- 7. Repeat steps 4 through 6 until all formats and prompting records are saved on the diskette.
- 8. Go to Ending a KEU Job in this section.

#### Selecting a Format or Prompting Record

- 1. Press the Sel Fmt key on the data entry type keyboards, or press the Cmd key and then press the Sel Fmt key on the typewriter keyboard.
- 2. Key in the format number (0, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, or 9) for the format or prompting record you want to select. You select a prompting record only if you want to perform some operation on the prompting record itself (such as to display or change the prompting record).
- If you have selected a format, the format and any associated prompting record is now active. If you have selected a prompting record, error code 9413 is displayed. In this case, press the Reset key or the Error Reset key. The prompting record is now selected and can be displayed or changed.

### **Displaying a Format or Prompting Record**

- 1. Select the format or prompting record you want to display:
  - a. Press the Sel Fmt key on the data entry type keyboards, or press the Cmd key and then press the Sel Fmt key on the typewriter keyboard.
  - b. Key in the format number (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, or 9) for the format or prompting record you want to select.

**Note:** If you selected a prompting record, error code 9413 is displayed. Press the Reset key and continue.

- 2. Press the Cmd key, hold down the Num key or the (Shift) key, then press the Display Format key. The format or prompting record is displayed.
- 3. To redisplay the data, you must press the Cmd key, hold down the Num key or the (Shift) key, then press the Display Data key.

#### **Changing a Format or Prompting Record**

- 1. Select the format or prompting record to be changed:
  - a. Press the Sel Fmt key on the data entry type keyboards, or press the Cmd key and then press the Sel Fmt key on the typewriter keyboard.
  - b. Key in the format number (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, or 9) for the format or prompting record you want to select.

**Note:** If you selected a prompting record, error code 9413 is displayed. Press the reset key and continue.

- 2. Press the Cmd key, hold down the Num key or the (Shift) key, then press the Change Format key. (The format or prompting record is displayed and format 0 is active.)
- 3. Change the format or prompting record, as desired.
- 4. To load the changed format or prompting record, press the Cmd key, hold down the Num key or the (Shift) key, then press the Load Format key.
- 5. Key in a format number (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, or 9).

A blank screen is now displayed and the system remains at the same record position. The changed format or prompting record is loaded and ready to be selected and used. To continue keying, select the desired format and continue.

#### Updating a Format or Prompting Record on a Diskette

Use this procedure if you have updated a format or prompting record since you loaded it from a diskette and you want to save the updated version.

1. Begin this procedure with the primary mode menu on the display.

2. Select update mode (option 2).

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- 3. Insert the diskette that contains the formats and prompting records.
- 4. Respond to the data set open prompt.

**Data set name**: Enter the name of the data set containing the format or prompting record that you want to update.

**Device address:** Enter the device address of the diskette drive containing the diskette with the formats and/or prompting records.

Press the Enter key.

- Press the Enter/Rec Adv key or the Page Fwd key until the format or prompting record you want to update is displayed, or do a search operation (see Search).
- 6. Select the altered format or prompting record:
  - a. Press the Sel Fmt key on the data entry type keyboards, or press the Cmd key and then press the Sel Fmt key on the typewriter keyboard.
  - b. Key in the format number (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, or 9) for the format or prompting record you want to select.

**Note:** If you selected a prompting record, error code 9413 is displayed. Press the Reset key and continue.

- 7. Press the Cmd key, hold down the Num key or the format or prompting record is displayed.
- 8. Key the first character of the format or prompting record. (For example, if the first character in the format is an N, press N.)
- 9. Press the Enter/Rec Adv key. The format or prompting record is written to the diskette.
- 10. If you have other formats or prompting records to update on the diskette, repeat steps 5 through 9.
- 11. Go to Ending a KEU Job in this section.

## FORMATS AND PROMPTING RECORDS

#### Formats

Here is what a typical format looks like.

A.....N-----A....D----R....S....E

The letters, except for the E, begin a data field and, hence, are called *Field Definition Characters*.

### Making A KEU Format

- 1. Start each field with a field definition character.
- After the field definition character, put the number of continuation characters, a – (dash) for numeric shift and a period. (period) for alphabetic shift, needed to complete the length of the field.

Picture check fields (fields that contain both alphabetic and numeric subfields) can also be defined. Start the field with the field definition character that applies to the first position of the field. Use the appropriate continuation characters to identify the shift for each subfield.

For example, assume that a picture check field has a length of ten characters. The field consists of four subfields. The first subfield is for alphabetic shift and is three positions long. The second subfield is numeric shift and is four positions long. The third subfield is alphabetic shift and is two positions long, and the fourth is a one-position numeric shift.

The field definition is:

A..----.-

3. Put an E one position past the end of your format (unless the length of the format equals the record length for the data set, in which case the E is not required). For example, if the record length is 80 and you have a 50-character format, you would put the E in position 51.

In effect, the E tells the system where the end of your format is. That is, when the system reads the E in your format, it bypasses any remaining positions of your record.

Use the *Format Code Chart* (provided later in this section) when you make your KEU format.

The following shows a sample format for a 79-position record as displayed after keying. Note that the format supplies a code for each of the 79 positions.

When a format is loaded in the system, it is given a format number. The valid numbers for formats are 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9.

## **Prompting Records**

The prompting record assists you by displaying a prompting message as you enter data. Here is a typical prompting record:

\*COMPANY NAME\*ADDRESS\*CITY AND STATE\*DUP\*SKIP\*

Or if you did not want a message in the dup and skip fields:

\*COMPANY NAME\*ADDRESS\*CITY AND STATE\*\*\*

The prompting message is displayed on line two.



## How To Use a Prompting Record

You key in a prompting record the same way you would key in a format. You then load the prompting record into an even-numbered format (2, 4, 6, or 8) the same way you would load a format. When you select an odd-numbered format, the prompting record is automatically activated. For example, when you select format 1, the prompting record in format 2 is also selected.

## How To Make a Prompting Record

- 1. Put an asterisk in position 1.
- 2. If you have a prompting message for the first field, key in the message and an asterisk. If you do not have a prompting message for the first field, key in only the asterisk in position 2.
- 3. If you have a prompting message for the next field, key in the message and an asterisk. If you do not have a message for this field, key in only the asterisk.
- 4. Repeat step 3 for the remaining fields in the format.

When you have finished, you should have an asterisk in position 1 plus an asterisk for each field in the format.

The following example shows a source document, its format, and a typical prompting record that might be used for a job.

For the data entry keyboard, the keyboard shifts function as follows:

- Alpha shift: The system automatically selects the lower character on the key top.
- Numeric shift: The system automatically selects the upper character on the key top.

Field totals are not supported by the key entry utility and any digit in the format is interpreted by the system as a numeric continuation character.

#### **Types of Fields Used in Formats**

## Manual Fields

Manual fields define the length of a field and the keyboard shift. The keyboard shift is either numeric or alpha. But the shift specified by the format can be overridden by pressing the Num Shift key or the Alpha Shift key on the data entry type keyboards.

A is the field definition character for alpha shift fields; N is the field definition character for numeric shift fields.

#### **Duplicate Fields**

Duplicate fields are used when you want data from the corresponding field or positions of the previous record automatically entered or verified in the current record when the auto dup/skip function is active. In other words, you eliminate keying repetitious material (see Dup/Skip in *Function Keys*).

The field definition characters are D (numeric) and U (alpha). However, the shifts specified by these characters are ignored by the system except when you are manually keying into a duplicate field.

#### Skip Fields

Skip fields are used when you want the system to automatically fill or verify fields with blanks when the auto dup/skip function is active. (See Dup/Skip in *Function Keys*).

The field definition characters are S (numeric) and K (alpha). However, the shifts specified by these characters are ignored by the system except when you are manually keying data into a skip field.

#### **Bypass Fields**

Bypass fields are used when you want the system to pass over a field and not allow you to key into it. This field is not affected by the Auto dup/skip function.

The field definition character is B. Since you cannot enter data in a bypass field, the shift is meaningless. But you must use either a . (period) or a - (dash) for field continuation characters.

#### Verify Bypass Fields

Verify bypass fields are used when you want the system to pass over a field only when in verify (V) mode. The data in the field is not verified. The field definition characters are V, W, X, Y, and Z. In enter (E) and update (U) modes, these five characters have the same functions as the characters N, A, R, J, and I respectively, as shown in the *Format Code Chart*.

#### **Right-Adjust Fields**

Right-adjust fields allow you to move data in the current field to the right field boundary by pressing the Field Exit key, or the Field + key, or the Field- key, or the – (dash) (data entry type keyboards only) key. Right-adjust fields must be at least two characters long; they can be as long as a whole record.

After moving the data to the right field boundary, the system inserts fill characters to the left of the first keyed character. The fill characters are either blanks or zeros depending on the field definition character you use. Field definition character R is for a numeric right-adjust field with zeros for fill characters; J is for a numeric right-adjust field with blanks for fill characters; I is for an alpha right-adjust field with blanks for fill characters.

Field definition characters X (zero fill character) and Y (blank fill character) are numeric, right-adjust, verify-bypass fields. Field definition character Z (blank fill character) is an alpha, right-adjust, verify-bypass field. These fields are bypassed in verify (V) mode. In enter (E) and update (U) modes, X, Y, and Z have the same function as R, J, and I respectively.

A picture check field cannot be specified as a right-adjust field.

#### Format Chaining

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Format chaining allows you to program the system so that it automatically switches from one format to another. Positions 127 and 128 of the format are the key to format chaining. Position 127 indicates the next format to select when a record backspace occurs. Position 128 indicates the next format to

select when a record advance occurs. Acceptable characters for format chaining are numbers 0 through 9.

In the following example, the format number is entered in position 128 to show the format that the system is to select automatically when a record advance occurs:

- 5. The data set open prompt might be displayed. See Opening the Data Sets Used by the DE/RPG Data Entry Program in this section.

The following actions depend on the mode that is selected.

The enter-NEW/REPLACE mode always begins with the first record of a data set. It is normally used only for initial entry of data; all data previously entered for this data set is lost.

The enter-ADD mode begins at the record following the last record of the data set. It is normally used to add data to an existing data set.

The update mode begins with the first data record in the data set. It is normally used to correct or change data in an existing data set.

The verify mode begins with the first data record in the data set. It is normally used to check the accuracy of entered data.

The rerun mode begins with the first data record in the data set. It is normally used to update automatically generated fields. When it reaches the end of the data set, the mode automatically changes to enter.

The next step in using a DE/RPG program is opening the data sets that are used.

## OPENING THE DATA SETS USED BY THE DE/RPG DATA ENTRY PROGRAM

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The mode of operation that is selected affects the following sequence. Steps 4 through 7 indicate the relationship of the mode and the open sequence.

1. Immediately after you have selected the mode of operation for the DE/RPG program, the following data set open prompt appears:



2. This prompt contains the name of the transaction data set and the device number.

Unless otherwise specified by your supervisor, accept the values that are displayed and press the Enter key. What follows depends on whether or not the data set that is named in the open prompt exists, whether it is volume protected, and the mode that is in effect.

3. If the data set exists and the diskette is volume protected, the volume protect prompt is displayed.

You must respond to this prompt before you can access the data set. If you do not know the owner identifier, contact the supervisor or programmer. When you have entered this information, press the Enter key. The data set open prompt is redisplayed. Press the Enter key.

4. If the data set exists and the mode that you selected is either enter-NEW/REPLACE or enter-ADD, the next display shows the first format in the program (display prompts and literals) but does not contain data.

**Note:** If the mode is enter-NEW/REPLACE, the record that is entered is the first record in the data set. If the mode is enter-ADD, the record that is entered is the one after the last data record in the data set.

- 5. If the data set exists, is not volume protected, and the mode that you selected is update, verify, or rerun, the next display shows the first format in the program and may display the data. The exact sequence of events for these modes is described in the appropriate topic later in this section.
- 6. If the data set does not already exist and you are in enter-ADD, update, verify, or rerun mode, a 3215 error occurs. The data set open prompt reappears when you press the Reset key. See the *Message Manual* for information on how to recover from this error.
- 7. If, however, you are in enter-NEW/REPLACE mode and the data set does not already exist, you can allocate it immediately. This procedure is described in the next topic.

The cursor will be positioned at the beginning of the first field. If you do not want to change the data in a field, exit the field with the field Advance) key.

If you do change the data in a field, exit the field with the Field + key or the Field Exit key.

You can change the name of the data set and the device address. Before you do, you should check with your supervisor.

The owner ID entry allows you to specify the user name under which the data set can be accessed. Do not enter anything in this field unless instructed by the supervisor.

The exchange type field also contains a system-supplied entry. You can change this value if necessary. The programmer should tell you which value to use. The values that are valid in this field are as follows:

Space = Basic exchange

H = H exchange

1 =l exchange

Normally a system-supplied number appears in the number of records entry. Change this number if so instructed by the supervisor or programmer. If the remainder of the space on the diskette is to be allocated for this data set, enter the value 000000 and use the Field Exit key or the Field + key to leave the field.

When you have completed the entries for this display, press the Enter key.

## ENTERING DATA USING A DE/RPG DATA ENTRY PROGRAM

To enter data, you must have selected either option 1 (enter-NEW REPLACE) or option 4 (enter-ADD) from the select initial data entry mode prompt. If you selected option 1, you are at the first data record in the data set, and the remainder of the records are blank. If you selected option 4, you are at the next available data record in the data set, and the preceding records (if any) contain data.

- 1. The first format in the DE/RPG program is displayed. Enter the data for the input fields.
- If the auto record advance function is active, the next record is automatically available for data entry upon completion of the current record. If the auto record advance function is not active, you must press the Enter key when you have completed the current record.

If you want to manually select formats to use for entering data, see the topic Selecting Formats for Data-Entry Programs in this section.

3. Repeat steps 1 and 2 until all the data has been entered.

4. End the job by following the procedure in *Ending a DE/RPG Data Entry Program*.

## SELECTING FORMATS FOR DATA-ENTRY PROGRAMS

1. To select a format within the program.

For data entry type keyboards: press the Sel Fmt key followed by the format identifier. If the format identifier contains an alphabetic character, press and hold the Alpha shift key to enter the alphabetic character.

For typewriter keyboards: press the Cmd key and the Sel Fmt key followed by the format identifier.

2. To select the next format in the program.

For data entry type keyboards: press the Next Fmt key.

For typewriter keyboards: press the Cmd key and the Next Fmt key.

## UPDATING DATA USING A DE/RPG DATA ENTRY PROGRAM

If you selected option 2 from the select initial data entry mode prompt to update data, you are at the first data record in the data set.

- 1. Press the Enter/Rec Adv key or the Page Fwd key, or use a search function to display the record you want to change. You may need to select the proper format.
- 2. Move the cursor to the field that is to be changed and enter the new data.
- 3. After you have updated the data record, press the Enter/Rec Adv key. The updated record is written in the data set.

**Note**: If the DE/RPG job has mandatory enter fields, you must reenter the field or press the Cmd key and the Edit Release key to bypass these fields before you can advance to the next record.

- 4. Locate the next record to be updated using the Enter/Rec Adv key, the Page Fwd key, or the Home key, or the search functions.
- 5. Repeat steps 2, 3 and 4 until you have updated all the data records within the data set. At EOD (end of data), the mode changes to enter mode. See *Entering Data Using a DE/RPG Data Entry Program.*
- 6. End the job by following the procedure in *Ending a DE/RPG Data Entry Program*.

### VERIFYING DATA USING A DE/RPG DATA ENTRY PROGRAM

To verify data, you must have selected option 3 of the select initial data entry mode prompt. The first data record in the data set is the record that is displayed. Input fields are not displayed.

If the auto record advance function is active, you do not need to press the Enter/Rec Adv key when you have completed the current record. To activate the auto record advance function, press the Auto Enter key.

- 1. Enter the data from the source document. As you enter each data character, the character appears on the display if it matches the original character in the record. If a data character does not match the original character in the record, an error code is displayed (see Correcting a Data Key Mismatch).
- 2. At the end of each record, press the Enter/Rec Adv key. The record is written back to the data set if changes were made.
- 3. When the last record is verified, the program automatically ends. (See Ending a DE/RPG Data Entry Program.)

#### **Correcting a Data Key Mismatch**

When a data key mismatch occurs, the system displays an error on the status line and the remainder of the field is displayed.

- 1. See the Message Manual for the proper recovery procedures, then press the Reset key or the Error Reset key.
- 2. If the data character mismatch resulted from a keying error, rekey the original character.

If the data character mismatch resulted from an incorrect character in the record in the data set, rekey the correct character.

Changes made to the record are updated on the diskette after you finish verifying the record and advance to the next record.

**Note:** A character is accepted only if it is keyed twice in succession or if it matches the original character.

To correct several characters or an entire field:

- 1. Press the Rec Corr key, or press and hold the Num key, and then press the Corr key (see *Function keys*). The system fills the field with blanks, and the cursor moves to the first position of the current field so you can rekey the field as you would in enter mode.
- 2. Enter the correct field data. When the field is complete, the system displays blanks in the field, and the cursor returns to the first position of the field so you can verify it.
- 3. Rekey the field to verify it.

To correct an entire record:

- 1. Press and hold the Num key, then press the Corr key, or press the Cmd key, then press the Rec Corr key (see *Function Keys*). The system displays the entire record with the cursor in the first position of the record. The mode indicator on the status line changes from V to V-C.
- 2. Enter the correct data (as if in update mode). When the record is complete, press the Enter/Rec Adv key if the auto record advance function is not active. The cursor returns to the first manual position of the record so you can verify it. The mode indicator changes back to V.
- 3. Rekey the record to verify it.

#### Correcting a Dup or Skip Mismatch

If a mismatch occurs when using the Dup or Skip key, or when a dup field or skip field is being automatically verified, the following sequence occurs:

- 1. The cursor stops at the position that caused the mismatch.
- 2. The entire field is displayed.
- 3. An error code for a verify mismatch is displayed on the status line.

To correct a dup mismatch:

- 1. Press the Reset key.
- 2. If the original character from the field being duplicated is correct, press the Dup key. The original character from the field being duplicated replaces the character in the current record. The system then continues automatic verification to the end of the field.

If the character in the current record is correct, rekey that character, then press the Dup key. The system then continues the automatic verification to the end of the field.

**Note:** If the AUXDUP keyword is specified for the field, the field being duplicated is a field in storage. If the AUXDUP keyword is not specified for the field, the corresponding field in the previous record is the field being duplicated.

To correct a skip mismatch:

- 1. Press the Reset key.
- 2. If the record is supposed to contain a blank in that position, press the Skip key. A blank replaces that position in the current record. The system then continues to verify the remaining positions of the field for blanks.

If the character in the data set record is correct, rekey that character, then press the Skip key. The system then continues to verify the remaining positions of the field for blanks.

### **Correcting An Automatic Field**

Verification of fields with insert or substitution data (INSERT or SUBST keywords were used in a DE/RPG program) is automatic. A unique verify mismatch error is displayed for automatic fields. (See the Message Manual.)

To correct an automatic field mismatch:

- 1. Press the Reset key.
- 2. If the data in the field is correct, press the Field Advance) key.
- If the data in the field is incorrect, initiate the field correct function. The data being supplied by the DE/RPG program replaces the data in the record.

#### Inserting a Record or Group of Records

If an entire record or a group of records is missing, follow these procedures:

- 1. Write down the record number that is displayed on the status line. (This is the record number of the first record inserted.)
- 2. Press the Cmd key, then press the Insert Record key.
- 3. The following prompt is displayed:

Enter the number of records to be inserted. (Valid entries are 1 through 99.) Press the Field + key or the Field Exit key, then press the Enter key. (The system displays a blank screen with format 0 selected.)

- 5. Select a format, if required (see Selecting Formats for Data Entry *Programs* in this section).
- 6. Key in the record and press the Enter/Rec Adv key. Repeat this step until insert mode ends. Insert mode ends when one of the following conditions occurs:
  - a. You have inserted the number of records that you specified in step 4.
  - b. You press the Cncl key and then the Rec Adv key. In this case, deleted records are automatically inserted until the number of records you specified in step 4 has been satisfied. The cursor is positioned in the first manual position of the next record.
  - c. You press the Home key while the cursor is in the first manual position of a record. In this case, deleted records are automatically inserted until the number of records you specified in step 4 has been satisfied. The cursor is positioned in the first manual position of the last record inserted.

**Note:** After you have keyed the last insert record, the status line positions that indicate the program mode blink until the insert function has been completed. When insert mode ends, the status line positions change back to V so you can continue to verify records.

7. To verify the records you just inserted, return to the record number you wrote down in step 1. You can return to this record number by pressing the Home key, or by using one of the search functions (see *Search*). Verify the records using the procedures described in this section.

## RERUNNING A DATA SET USING A DE/RPG DATA ENTRY PROGRAM

To rerun a data set, you must have selected option 5 on the select initial data entry mode prompt. The first record in the data set is displayed, and each succeeding record is displayed without operator interaction.

When all data records in the data set have been displayed, the system displays the next record past the end of data as if enter-ADD mode were in effect. If an error is detected during the rerun mode, the program stops and displays the error code.

- 1. If data in the record is in error, press the Reset key to stop the status line from blinking. Press the Cmd key and the Mark Field key to mark the field in error.
- 2. If data in the record is correct, press the Reset key to stop the status line from blinking. Press the Cmd key and the Edit Release key to proceed to the next field.

## ENDING A DE/RPG DATA ENTRY PROGRAM

The program determines the way in which the DE/RPG job must be ended. If the DE/RPG programs contains an EOJ (end of job) operation, the program automatically ends when the EOJ is encountered. If the program does not

contain an EOJ operation, the operator must end the program by using the Cmd key and the End of Job key.

When a DE/RPG program is ended, the following prompt may be displayed:

## **OPENING DATA SETS FOR A DE/RPG APPLICATION PROGRAM**

It is possible that multiple data sets may be used by a single DE/RPG program. In this case, once you conclude an open for one data set, you immediately see the open prompt for the next data set. Proceed through the open prompts as described until the last prompt is displayed and processing begins.

You can change the name of the data set and the device address. Before you do, you should check with your supervisor.

The owner ID entry allows you to specify the user name under which the data set can be accessed. Do not enter anything in this field unless instructed by the supervisor.

The exchange type field also contains a system-supplied entry. You can change this value if necessary. The programmer should tell you which value to use. The values that are valid in this field are as follows:

- a. Enter a search mask, enclosed in apostrophes. For example, 'Minnesota' could be entered for the mask. If fewer than 18 positions are used for the mask, use the Field Exit key or the Field + key to exit the field.
- b. Enter the position within the record where the mask begins. For example, if the word Minnesota begins in the first position of the record, enter 1. Use the Field Exit key or the Field + key to exit the field.
- c. Enter the position within the record where the mask ends. If left blank, the length of the mask determines the end position. For example, if the word Minnesota begins in position 1, it ends in position 9. Use the Field Exit key or the Field + key to exit the field.

- 4. Press the Cmd key and the Return to Transaction Data Set key to end the copy operation.
- 5. Terminate the job using the procedure described in the topic Ending a DE/RPG Data Entry Program in this section.

#### **PRINTING RECORDS USING DE/RPG**

Records can be printed by data entry DE/RPG programs by using the Print key or by application DE/RPG programs by using the formatted print operation.

#### PRINTING RECORDS IN DATA ENTRY PROGRAMS

#### Printing a Block of Records Using a DE/RPG Program

- 1. Press the Auto Enter key (a reverse image R appears in the status line).
- 2. Press the Print key.

If the data set for the print operation has not been opened, the data set open prompt is displayed. Respond to the data set open prompt.

The printed data does not necessarily represent the format of the displayed data. (This is due to reformatting. The printed record matches the diskette record.)

- 3. Successive records are printed until one of the following conditions has been met:
  - a. You press the Auto Enter key again to turn off the auto enter function.

- b. The end of the data is reached.
- c. You press the Cncl key.
- 4. To terminate the job, see the topic Ending a DE/RPG Data Entry Program in this section.

- Repeat step 5 until insert mode ends. Insert mode ends when one of the following conditions occur:
  - a. You have inserted the number of records that you specified in step 3.
  - b. You press the Cncl key and then the Enter/Rec Adv key. In this case, deleted records are automatically inserted until the number of records you specified in step 3 has been satisfied. The cursor is positioned in the first manual position of the next record.
  - c. You press the Home key while the cursor is in the first manual position of a record. In this case, deleted records are automatically inserted until the number of records you specified in step 3 has been satisfied. The cursor is positioned in the first manual position of the last record inserted.

**Note:** After you have keyed the last insert record, the status line positions that indicate the program mode blinks until the insert function has been completed.

#### **DELETING A RECORD**

Deleted records take up space in the data set and are included in the numbering of the records in the data set. To delete one or more records in the data set:

- 1. Make sure you are in the enter, update or verify mode.
- 2. Press the Page Fwd key, or use one of the search functions, until the record you want to delete is displayed.
- 3. Press the Cmd key and the Delete Record key to delete the record.

In enter mode, pressing the Delete Record key blanks the display screen, transfers a deleted record to the data set, and positions the cursor to the first manual field of the next record.

In update or verify modes, pressing the Delete Record key causes the currently displayed record to be deleted in the data set and the next sequential record is displayed.

4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 for each record to be deleted.

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There are four ways to search a data set that has been opened:

· Search end of data

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- · Search relative record number
- · Search content
- Search sequential content

These search operations can be used during the following modes:

- DE/RPG-Copy, update, and verify
- KEU–Update and verify

When a search operation is active, the program mode positions on the status line contain x-S.

Search content and search sequential content differ as follows:

- When searching sequential content, data in fields being searched must be in ascending alpha (A through Z), numeric (0 through 9), or alphameric (A through Z, then 0 through 9) sequence.
- · Search sequential content is faster.
- Search content searches only in the specified direction; forward to the end of the data set or backward to the beginning of the data set. Search sequential content searches in both directions (forward and backward) for the desired record.
- Search content uses from 1 to 3 search masks. Search sequential content uses only one search mask.

#### SEARCH END OF DATA

This search operation finds the last record in a data set. When the search is completed, the last record in the data set is displayed. To use this search:

1. Press the Cmd key, hold down the Num key or the (Shift) key, and press the Search End of Data key.

#### SEARCH RELATIVE RECORD NUMBER

This search operation finds a particular record by its relative record number within the data set. The relative record number is the physical location of a record relative to the beginning of the data set. For example, if a data set contains the following records:

Record DDDD has a relative record number of 4, because it is in the fourth physical record location from the beginning of the data set.

When the search is complete, the record at the specified relative record number position is displayed. To use this search:

- 1. Press the Cmd key and the Search Record Number key.
- 2. When the following prompt appears:

Enter the relative record number of the record you want to display.

- 3. Press the Field Exit key or the Field + key.
- 4. Press the Enter key.

#### SEARCH CONTENT

This search operation finds the record in a data set that contains specified data. The data can be located in up to three different areas in the record. If a record containing the specified data is found, that record is displayed. If a record is not found, an error occurs. When the Reset key is pressed, the first

record in the data set is displayed for a backward search or the last record in the data set is displayed for a forward search. To use this search:

- 1. Press the Cmd key and the Search Content key.
- 2. The following prompt appears:

- a. Mask-Enter the data for the record for which you are searching. The mask can consist of up to 16 characters, and it must begin and end with an apostrophe. For example, 'MINNESOTA'. If you do not fill the MASK field, press the Field Exit key or the Field + key.
- b. Start-Enter the starting position where the data you specified is located in the record, and then press the Field Exit key or the Field + key. If the starting position is not specified, position 1 of the record is used as the starting position.
- c. End-Enter the ending position where the data you specified is located in the record, and then press the Field Exit key or the Field + key. If the ending position is not specified, the ending position equals the starting position plus the number of characters specified in the mask.

**Note:** To search the entire record for the specified mask, specify the starting position as 1 and the ending position as the number of characters in the record.

- 3. You can specify upto three masks for the search operation. To specify another mask, repeat step 2.
- 4. To search forward from the next record (not the current record) to the end of the data set, press the Enter key.

To search backward from the current record to the beginning of the data set, press the Home key.

#### SEARCH SEQUENTIAL CONTENT

This search operation finds a record in a data set that contains specified data. The data field being searched must be in ascending order from record to record. The entire data set is searched, regardless of which record is displayed when the search begins. If a record containing the specified data is found, that record is displayed. If a record is not found, an error occurs. When the Reset key is pressed, the record in the ascending order that would follow a record containing the specified data is displayed. To use this search:

- 1. Press the Cmd key and the Search Seq Content key.
- 2. The following prompt is displayed:

06-86 T

a. Mask-Enter the data for the record for which you are searching. The mask can consist of up to 16 characters, and is must begin and end with an apostrophe. For example, 'MINNESOTA'. If you do not fill the mask field, press the Field Exit key or the Field + key.
b. Start-Enter the starting position where the data you specified is located in the record, and then press the Field Exit key or the Field + key. If the starting position is not specified, position 1 of the record is used as the starting position.

3. Press the Enter key to start the search.

The search might not stop on the first record of a group of records containing the data specified in step 2. If the search stops at a record not sought, perform a record backspace or a record advance operation to find the record sought.

#### Notes:

- 1. If records in the data set are not in ascending order, the record being searched for might not be found using search sequential content even though the record exists in the data set.
- 2. If the record cannot be found, return to the first record in the data set and do a search content operation.

# RESUMING THE SEARCH CONTENT AND SEARCH SEQ CONTENT OPERATIONS

If you have used a search content or search sequential content operation for the current data set, the next time you use these searches, the old search mask you previously specified appears. You can either reuse these values or enter new ones.

#### **CANCELLING A SEARCH OPERATION**

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A search operation (search record number, or search content, or search sequential content) can be canceled while the search prompt is displayed, by pressing the Num key or the from (Shift) key and the Cncl key. When the search is canceled, the record from which the search was requested is displayed. Once the search operation has started, it cannot be canceled.

### Data Entry Keyboard



#### **Data Entry Keyboard With Proof Arrangement**



The data entry and data entry with proof arrangement keyboards are identical, except for the location of the numeric keys and the spacebar function. When using the data entry keyboard with proof arrangement, the Spacebar functions as a dual purpose key. When the keyboard is in alpha shift, pressing the Spacebar creates a space (blank character). When the keyboard is in numeric shift, pressing the Spacebar creates a zero (0) character. In addition to the Spacebar, the  $\begin{bmatrix} s \\ r \\ r \end{bmatrix}$  key can be used to create a space (blank character). The space function on the  $\begin{bmatrix} s \\ r \\ r \end{bmatrix}$  key is only active when the keyboard is in numeric shift. Both keyboards support only the uppercase (A through Z) alphabetic characters.

For data entry type keyboards, the field definition position on the status line indicates whether the current input field is in alpha or numeric shift. When the current input field is in alpha shift, the bottom character on the key is entered when you press the key. When the current input field is in numeric shift, the top characte: on the key is entered when you press the key. For example:

This character is entered when the current , input field is in numeric shift

π<sup>2</sup> C,

This character is entered when the current input field is in alpha shift

You can use the Num key or the Alpha key to change the shift and the character entered when you press a key. For example, if the current input field is in numeric shift, you can press and hold the Alpha key and then press  $\begin{bmatrix} 1\\ c\\ c \end{bmatrix}$  to enter the character C.

#### Typewriter Keyboard

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The typewriter keyboard supports the entry of both uppercase (A through Z) and lowercase (a through z) alphabetic characters.



#### **KINDS OF KEYS**

Each keyboard has three basic kinds of keys: data keys, function keys, and command keys.

#### **Data Keys Overview**

The following illustrations show the data keys on the 5280 keyboard. All data keys are typamatic. This means that when the key is held down, it repeats its character until the key is released.

#### Signed Numeric Field

The data to the left of the cursor is shifted right to the position next to the rightmost position of the field on the screen. The vacated positions to the left of the data are filled with zeros. The rightmost field position, which is reserved for the sign, is blanked to indicate a positive sign.

If the key is pressed when the cursor is in the leftmost position of a signed numeric field, all positions except the rightmost position are filled with zeros, and the rightmost position is set to blank.

# **Right-Adjust Field**

In a right-adjust field that is not signed numeric, the data to the left of the cursor is shifted to the right. The vacated positions to the left of the data are filled with the appropriate fill character (zeros or blanks as specified by the field definition).

If the key is pressed when the cursor is in the leftmost position of the field, the entire field is filled with the appropriate fill character.

#### Verify

#### Non-Right-Adjust Field

If awaiting field exit in a non-right-adjust field, the field is exited.

If not awaiting field exit in a non-right-adjust field, all positions above and to the right of the cursor are verified for blanks.

If a verify mismatch error occurs, the entire field is displayed with the cursor positioned under the character that caused the error. If the Field Exit key is pressed after the Reset key is pressed, the nonblank character in the record is replaced with a blank and automatic verification continues to the end of the field.

#### **Right-Adjust Field**

In a right-adjust field, the Field Exit key is valid only when the cursor is in the leftmost position of a field or while awaiting field exit.

If the key is pressed when the cursor is in the leftmost position of a field, the entire field is verified for the appropriate fill character (zeros or blanks as specified by the field definition). If a verify mismatch error occurs, the entire field is displayed with the cursor positioned under the character that caused the error. If the Field Exit key is pressed after the Reset key is pressed, the character in the record is replaced with the fill character and automatic verification continues to the end of the field.

If the key is pressed while awaiting field exit, the sign of the data (if numeric) is verified for a positive value. If a verify sign mismatch error occurs and if the Field Exit key is pressed after the Reset key is pressed, the sign of the data is changed to positive and the field is exited.

#### Enter, Update, Field Correct, and Record Correct Modes

Pressing the Field - key assigns a negative value to the field, and exits the field.

If the key is pressed while awaiting field exit, the last character in the field is checked for a digit (0-9). If it is not a digit, an error occurs. If it is a digit, a negative value is assigned to the field in the record. If the field is signed numeric, a minus sign is displayed to the right of the field. If the field is not signed numeric, the negative graphic for the digit replaces the rightmost digit in the field on the screen. The negative graphic that is displayed depends on the field type and the rightmost digit, as follows.

If the key is pressed while not awaiting field exit, operations are performed on the data in the field, depending on the current definition, as follows.

# Non-Right-Adjust Field

The positions from the cursor to the next-to-the-last position in the field are set to blanks. The last position in the field is set to negative zero in the record. The negative zero graphic is displayed in the last field position. (Negative zero is displayed as  $\rangle$  for a numeric shift field, and  $\overline{0}$  for a numeric only or digits only field.)

# Signed Numeric Field

The data to the left of the cursor is shifted right. The positions to the left of the data are filled with zeros. The rightmost character is checked for a digit (0-9). If it is not a digit, an error occurs. If it is a digit, a minus sign is displayed in the sign position.

If the key is pressed when the cursor is in the leftmost position of the field, the field positions are filled with zeros, and a minus sign is displayed in the sign position.

# Right-Adjust Field

If the field is a right-adjust field that is not signed numeric, the data to the left of the cursor is shifted right. The positions to the left of the data are filled with the appropriate fill character (zeros or blanks as specified by the field definition). The rightmost character is checked for a digit (0-9). If it is not a digit, an error occurs. If it is a digit, it is replaced on the screen with the negative graphic for the digit (as described above).

If the key is pressed when the cursor is in the leftmost position of the field, the field positions, except the rightmost position, are filled with the appropriate fill character. The rightmost position is set to a negative zero, and displayed as a negative zero () for numeric shift,  $\vec{0}$  for digits only or numeric only).

The following chart shows the operations performed on the data in the different types of fields if the Field - key is pressed: A when the cursor is in the leftmost position of the field, B while not awaiting field exit, and C while awaiting field exit.

#### Verify

Verification depends upon the current field definition.

#### Non-Right-Adjust-Adjust Field

If the key is pressed while awaiting field exit, the rightmost character in the field is checked for a negative value. If the character is negative 0 through 9, the digit is replaced on the screen with the corresponding negative graphic, and the field is exited. If the character does not have a negative value, a verify sign mismatch error occurs. If the Field – key is pressed after the Reset key is pressed, the value is changed to negative, and the field is exited.

If not awaiting field exit, the positions above and to the right of the cursor, except the last field position, are verified for blanks. If a nonblank character is encountered, a verify mismatch error occurs and the entire field is displayed with the cursor positioned under the character that caused the error. If the Field - key is pressed after the Reset key is pressed, the nonblank character in the record is replaced with a blank, and the verification continues. The last field position is verified for a negative zero. If it is a negative zero, the graphic for negative zero is displayed, and the field is exited. If it is not a negative zero, a verify mismatch error occurs and the entire field is displayed. If the Field - key is pressed after the Reset key is pressed, the character in the record is replaced with a negative zero and the field is exited.

#### Signed Numeric

The key is valid only while awaiting field exit or when the cursor is in the leftmost position of the field.

If the key is pressed while awaiting field exit, the rightmost character in the field is verified for a negative value. If the character is negative, a minus sign is displayed in the sign position and the field is exited. If the character does not have a negative value, a verify sign mismatch error occurs. If the Field – key is pressed after the Reset key is pressed, the sign of the data is made negative and the field is exited.

If the key is pressed when the cursor is in the leftmost position of the field, all positions are verified for zeros. If a character other than a zero is encountered, a verify mismatch error occurs, and the entire field is displayed with the cursor under the character that caused the error. If the Field - key is pressed again after the Reset key is pressed, the character in the record is replaced with a zero and the verification continues. The rightmost character in the field is verified for a negative zero. If it is a negative zero, a minus sign is displayed in the sign position and the field is exited. If it is a positive zero, a verify sign mismatch error occurs. If the Field - key is pressed after the Reset key is pressed, the rightmost field position in the record is replaced with a negative zero and the field is exited.

#### Right-Adjust Field

In a right-adjust field that is not signed numeric, the key is valid only while awaiting field exit or when the cursor is in the leftmost position of the field. While awaiting field exit, the character in the rightmost position is verified for a negative value. If the character is negative 0 through 9, the character on the screen is replaced with the corresponding negative graphic, and the field is exited. If the character does not have a negative value, a verify sign mismatch error occurs. If the Field – key is pressed after the Reset key is pressed, the character in the record is replaced with the corresponding negative value and the field is exited.

If the key is pressed when the cursor is in the leftmost position of the field, all positions of the field are verified for the appropriate fill character (zeros or blanks, depending on the field definition). If a character other than the fill character is encountered, a verify mismatch error occurs, and the entire field is displayed with the cursor under the character that caused the error. If the Field - key is pressed after the Reset key is pressed, the character is replaced with the fill character, and verification continues. The rightmost position of the field is verified for a negative value. If it is a negative value, the negative graphic is displayed in the rightmost position of the field on the screen, and the field is exited. If it is not a negative value, a verify sign mismatch error occurs. If the Field - key is pressed after the Reset key is pressed, a negative value replaces the character in the record and the field is exited.

# LOADING THE COMMUNICATIONS EXECUTION UTILITIES

1. Begin with the load prompt on your display.

2. Insert the diskette containing the communications utility program.
3. If the keylock feature is installed on your 5280 system, insert the proper key and turn it to the left.



Note: See Keylock Feature for information about the keylock settings.

4. Enter the required information for the load prompt.

**Program name:** Enter the program name for the communications utility and press the Field Exit key or the Field + key.

**Device address:** Enter the device address of the diskette drive containing the communications utility.

**Partition number**: Enter the number of the partition where you want to load the communications utility. The utility can execute in either a foreground or background partition. The run book should provide the correct partition number.

- 5. Press the Enter key.
- 6. Respond to the prompts that are displayed.

#### **ESTABLISHING A COMMUNICATIONS CONNECTION**

The following message is displayed by the communications utility when the communications connection should be established.

#### ESTABLISH CONNECTION IF NECESSARY.

If the communications line is switched and the connection type is manual call, dial the system with which the 5280 is to communicate. Place the modem in the data mode when the answer tone is received. The run book should provide the correct telephone number to dial and the appropriate procedures required to place the modem in data mode.

If the line is switched and the connection type is manual answer, answer the telephone when it rings and place the modem in data mode; if the connection is auto answer, it is necessary only to ensure that the modem is in answer mode.

If the line is nonswitched, no action is required and the previous message appears only briefly.

The following diagrams show the procedures for establishing a communications connection.



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If you have an external modern, it should have a Talk/Data switch. This switch must be in the talk position until just prior to raising the exclusion key.

**Note:** When you wish to break the connection, you must hang up the handset. If a Talk/Data switch is provided by the modem, return the Talk/Data switch to the talk position.

# REMOVING THE COMMUNICATIONS ACCESS METHOD PROGRAM FROM A PARTITION

After you have run all your communications jobs, using either a user-written application program or one of the IBM-supplied DB/DC utilities (SYSBBTU, SYSBDCU or SYSSDCU), you should remove the CAM from its partition.

Use the keyboard/display that was used to load the CAM. The CAM was either loaded automatically by one of the communications execution utilities or by you using SYSCLU. Determine from the run book if the program was loaded into a background partition or a foreground partition.

## If the communications access method program is in a foreground partition:

- 1. Press the Cmd key.
- 2. Press the End of Job command key.

If the communications access method program is in a background partition:

1. Press the following keys in sequence.

Cmd C B

2. Enter the partition number where the CAM is loaded.

- 3. Press the Cmd key.
- 4. Press the End of Job command key.

If a communications job, using either a user-written application program or any of the IBM-supplied communications execution utilities, does not terminate normally, it may be necessary to cancel the CAM. This will also remove the CAM from its partition. To cancel the CAM, follow the same procedure as described above, but instead of using the End of Job command key in step 2 and step 4, do the following:

Press and hold the Num key or the Cncl key.

(Shift) key, then press the

### ACCENTED DATA CHARACTERS

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There are three methods of keying characters that are accented.

The first method is to press a key that has the accented character on the keytop. This method is identical to keying any data character. The following keyboard shows an example of a key with an accented character on the keytop.



The second method is to press a combination of keys to obtain the desired accented character. The keyboard shows an example of a key with an accent mark on the keytop. To use this method, the following conditions must exist:

- The accent mark must be on a keytop.
- The IPL diskette used must have been configured to select the multinational character set for this keyboard.
- The combination of the accent mark and the data character must be valid (the chart at the end of this appendix shows the valid characters).

To use this method:

- Key the accent mark. The accent is displayed but the cursor does not advance to the next position. If the cursor advances, or if the cursor blinks, this keyboard was not configured for the multinational character set.
- 2. Key the data character. The combined data character is displayed and the cursor advances to the next position.

To enter an accent character only, press the key containing the Accent character and then press the spacebar.

If an error occurs because an invalid data character is keyed, press the Reset key or the Error Reset key and then rekey the accent character followed by a valid data character.

The third method is to use the hex key function to enter an accented character that cannot be entered by using one of the previous methods.

To use the hex key function do the following:

- 1) Press the Cmd key and then press the key below the Hex label on the keyboard template.
- 2) Key the two hex characters that represent the desired accented character (see the following chart for accented characters and corresponding Hex values).

If an error occurs because an invalid hex character is keyed, press the Reset key or the Error Reset key and then repeat steps 1 and 2.

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**alpha only field:** A field in which only the following characters are valid: the characters of the alphabet (both uppercase and lowercase), comma, period, dash, and blank. If any other character is entered into this type of field, an error results. The keyboard shift is positioned to automatically select the lower symbol on each keytop.

 alphabetic shift field: A field type in which all characters are valid. The keyboard shift is positioned to automatically select the lower symbol on each keytop.

application program: A program that processes user
data to perform a particular data processing task; for
example, inventory control or payroll.

auto dup: Automatic duplication. 1. In enter and update modes, the process of automatically copying the contents of a field in a previous record or in storage into the corresponding positions of the current record. 2. In verify mode, the process of automatically comparing the contents of a field in the current record with the contents of the corresponding positions of a previous

record or in storage.

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auto record advance: Automatic record advance. The process of automatically advancing to the next

sequential record when the current record is complete.

**auto skip**: Automatic skip. 1. In enter mode and update mode, the process of automatically filling a field with blanks and advancing to the next field. 2. In verify mode, the process of verifying that all the positions in the field are blank.

**awaiting field exit:** A condition indicated by a blinking cursor and by the positions remaining in the field counter on the status line being equal to 1. This means that the input field (which has been specified as a field exit required field) has been filled with data. You must press a field exit key to continue.

**awaiting record advance:** A condition indicated by a blinking cursor and by the input record character position counter on the status line being equal to 0. This means that the record or prompt has been filled with data. You must press the Enter/Rec Adv key to continue.

**backup diskette**: A diskette that contains information that was copied from another diskette and is used in case the original information is unintentionally altered or destroyed.

**background job:** A job that is run in a partition which does not have immediate access to a keyboard/display unit.

**blank fill:** In a right-adjust field, the process of filling the positions to the left of the data with blanks.

**compiler:** A program that translates (compiles) a series of instructions, written in a programming language, into a program the system can execute.

**copy**: To duplicate data from one place to another, leaving the original data unchanged.

data set: A collection of data records treated as a unit and existing on a diskette.

data set label: An area on the diskette that describes a data set.

data set name: The name associated with a data set. Blanks cannot appear between characters in a name.

**default value**: A value automatically chosen by the system when a value is not specified by the user.

**device address:** The characters used to identify a device such as a diskette drive or printer.

digits only field: A field in which only the characters O through 9 are valid. If any other character is entered into this type of field, an error results. For data entry type keyboards, the keyboard shift is positioned to automatically select the upper symbol on each data key. For typewriter keyboards, the keyboard shift is positioned to automatically select the lower symbol on each data key.

**EBCDIC:** Extended binary-coded decimal interchange code.

edit: To check or modify the form or format of data.

**execute mode:** The process of carrying out the instructions of a computer program.

**field**: One or more characters of related information in a record.

field length: The number of positions in a field.

**field correct mode**: A sub-mode of verify mode, which allows the operator to correct an entire field with a minimum of keystrokes.

file: The collection of related records.

**foreground job**: A job that is run in a partition that has immediate access to a keyboard/display unit.

format: DE/RPG: A specific arrangement of information used to display a record. KEU: A specific arrangement of field definition characters and field continuation characters that define the fields in a data record.

format chaining: Defined sequence of formats to be used in entering, verifying, or updating data records.

**format 0 (zero):** A format that is simple character alpha shift fields. The length of the format is the record length of the opened data set.

hex: Hexadecimal.

**hexadecimal field:** A field in which only the following characters are valid: 0 through 9, and A through F. If any other character is entered into this type of field, an error results. Each pair of hex digits entered into the field is combined to form one position within the field. For data entry type keyboards, the keyboard shift is positioned to automatically select the upper symbol on each data key. For typewriter keyboards, the keyboard shift is positioned to automatically select the lower symbol on each data key.

**host ID:** The identification of the system that the 5280 is connected to for the purpose of data communication.

**initial program load (IPL):** A sequence of events that loads the system programs and prepares the system for execution of jobs.

**job:** A program and associated data that can be processed in a partition.

mark: To place an indicator in a field or record.

**marked record:** A record that contains a mark that indicates that one or more data fields in the record are incomplete or incorrect.

**menu:** A displayed list of items from which the operator makes a selection.

numeric only field: A field in which only the following characters are valid: 0 through 9, comma, period, dash, plus sign, and blank. If any other character is entered into this type of field, an error results. For data entry type keyboards, the keyboard shift is positioned to automatically select the upper symbol on each data key. For typewriter keyboards, the keyboard shift is positioned to automatically select the lower symbol on each data key.

**numeric shift field:** A field type in which all characters are valid. For data entry type keyboards, the keyboard shift is positioned to automatically select the upper symbol on each data key. For typewriter keyboards, the keyboard shift is positioned to automatically select the lower symbol on each data key.

**partition**: An area of storage in which a program can be stored and processed.

print file: The organization of data for formatted printing and for printer forms control.

production statistics: Statistics related to keyboard activities occurring during data entry operations.

**program:** A set of sequential instructions that tells the system where to get input, how to process it, and where to put the results.

**program listing:** A computer printout that gives information about a program.

**prompt:** A displayed message usually requesting the operator to enter information.

**record correct mode:** A sub-mode of verify, which allows the operator to correct an entire record with a minimum of keystrokes.

**record length:** The number of characters positions in a record.

**right adjust**: To shift the contents of a field so that the last character keyed is in the rightmost position of the field.

**right-adjust field**: A field in which data is automatically right-adjusted if the Field Exit key or the Field + key, or the Field - key is used to exit the field.

**search**: To find a record or data set using search arguments provided by the user.

**search mask**: A pattern of characters used to find data records.

signed numeric field: A right-adjust, zero fill, digits only field in which the rightmost position of the field on the screen is reserved for the sign of the data in the field.

storage: The area in the system where programs and data are loaded and processed.

transaction data set: A data set that contains records associated with a specific job.

**unattended operation**: The processing of data by a data station at which an operator is not present.

**verify mark:** An indication on a record or a data set that it has been verified.

work file: An area on diskette that is reserved for temporary storage of data being processed.

**zero fill**: In a right-adjust field, the process of filling the positions to the left of the data with zeros.
